





The objective of the scholarships is to help reduce financial barriers for students with disabilities as they progress and work towards completing high-school and assist them in preparing for a successful transition into post-secondary education, or entry into the workforce. The grant recipient also has the opportunity to participate in a year-long mentorship program, where they will be paired with a volunteer mentor who can provide encouragement, guidance, and support for their studies, and in preparing for post-secondary studies, as well as summer jobs and/or transition to the labour force after graduating high school.

I think if you could really understand the long-lasting impact of your work for our son Nick, and for us as his family, I think it might surprise you.

Our son Nick is a mentally challenged "boy" of 26. For the last two years, he along with so many of his counterparts (and of course everyone in the world), has been isolated without much to look forward to. Camp Tidnish operating again in 2021 has made a world of difference. Voyageurs at the end of June made his year.

I have a slightly different perspective because the first year Nick went to camp I stayed there. I saw firsthand what your days and nights are like, how challenging and tiring the work is, and the joy and love the team gives to the campers. In essence I was able to walk a mile in your shoes. This year, no one was from the previous Tidnish camps (except Alice!) – and the difficulty of losing that institutional knowledge that usually is available through returning counsellors has to be really hard! But you are doing it.

Nick is still asking when he can go back, how is Taylor, Roxy, Pickle, Alice – everyone. He looks at the Facebook page and exclaims about all of you. Your summer job brings people like Nick immeasurable joy, a break from everyday life, and memories that sustain his ongoing days.

I thank you from the bottom of my heart. On these unbelievably hot days, where you don't get a break, remember you are doing something extraordinary with lasting effect.

"Cooper has been a part of the Easter Seals Nova Scotia programming for as long as I can remember - indeed no less than eight years. His longest involvement has been with Learn to Sledge and most recently with Learn to Ride. While Cooper has beaten the odds in so many ways in terms of the possible impacts of his syndrome, there is still a void in terms of activities and experiences that allow him to participate that are truly inclusive.

Simply put, the programs offered through Easter Seals are truly inclusive and without them Cooper's development would not be as bright and shiny as it is today. For us as a family, inclusive means that Cooper can participate in an activity that defines participation as being able to be involved as who he is. Equally so, inclusive means having a broader vision of success as well. Inclusion means that there is a space for him to participate and feel success and accomplishment within his abilities and not have the goal or pressure to reach that of able-bodied peers. The latter happens through activities that are structured and adapted ahead of time - not afterwards - and through having leadership and facilitators/coaches that have a broad vision of what success looks like.

Sadly, we have all too often encountered community programs that claim to be inclusive but when trying to get him involved his participation ends with conversations like "if we can" or "when we have staffing" or "oh sorry but our facility can only accommodate...". Easter Seals understands that programs need to be built from the ground up with inclusive design and not as a renovation after implementation."
