Our reflections post-covid has enabled us to sharpen our focus on the core programs and services that matter to the people and families that we serve.

We have expanded our reach to rural and regional Nova Scotia; so, needed and welcomed! We are proud to have opened our first satellite office in Yarmouth. Our staff there have embraced the challenge of a new office in a community that is so welcoming to the programs and services that we offer. We have expanded the Take Part programs in Southwestern Nova Scotia and Cape Breton – also possible because of the strong community welcome and strength.

We were able to stabilize our funding from the Department of Community Services for the wheelchair recycling program and I'm proud to say we have no waitlist for this important program.

I continue to be impressed by the New Leaf programming. We have been able to increase our capacity in programs and new clients and I have, personally, enjoyed the fruit of their strong efforts. We have seen significant increases in food production, sales, and client base.

Camp Tidnish remains an anchor program for us. We are so happy to be opening this summer and we know that this camp is life-changing for our campers and for the staff and leaders who support the Camp. We know that this camp provides an experience for people who would not normally have a traditional 'camp' experience. We have been working with our special friends at the Amherst Rotary Club to ensure that the facilities meet our needs, and more importantly, the needs of our campers. We are working on a longer-term sustainability plan for Camp Tidnish, as we know it is a beacon for our clients and their families.

None of this would have been possible without Joanne and the management team and program staff of Easter Seals NS. These dedicated people are steadfast in their dedication to our clients. Your Board of Directors is grateful to you for your expertise, your energy, and your hard work. I also extend gratitude to the community and our government partners, donors, sponsors, and volunteers for their ongoing support. Message From Our President & CEO – Joanne Bernard

The past year has been nothing short of amazing! We saw our physical footprint expand outside of the Halifax Regional Municipality with the opening of our new office in Yarmouth in December 2022. Now kids and seniors living with disabilities in Yarmouth County have access to boccia, sledge and wheelchair basketball. The office also supports the expansion of our Assistive Devices and Wheelchair Recycling program in that area of the province.

At the opposite end of the province, a new partnership with Wheelchair Basketball Canada, Sport Nova Scotia and Cape Breton University saw Learn to Wheel start in Sydney. This program joins Learn to Sledge in Glace Bay which is now in its 4th year.

Take Part has expanded its reach within the Halifax Regional Municipality with collaborations with Schools Plus and most notably the School of Health and Human Performance within Dalhousie University. Under ESNS Board Member, Sarah Moore, students from her classes volunteer with all Take Part inclusive sports programs, giving participants and volunteers valuable experiences while counting towards their class marks.

New Leaf Enterprises continues to increase its' catering customer base and both cafés' are busy offering delicious baked and homed cooked entrées. New Leaf also continues to expand its reach with employment supports and establishing extraordinary new partnerships with other organizations and high schools.

Assisted Mobility and the Wheelchair Recycling Program has expanded their support services and with increased funding from the Nova Scotia Department of Community Services, the waitlist for the WRP has been eliminated for the first time in the program's 20-year history.

Most special was the return of Camp Tidnish in 2022 after a two-year shut down due to the pandemic. Opening at 50% capacity, old and new campers returned for a fun filled camping season which had been sorely missed by everyone. The addition of Camp Director Roxy Peterson has been a game changer as he brings his enthusiasm, experience and new ideas to create even more "Camp Magic".

On a personal note, I was humbled and proud to be named Business Leader of the Year by the Halifax Chamber of Commerce. It was a wonderful night shared with staff, board members and my family. The Award was a testament to the dedicated staff team I work with each day which makes my job that much easier. Volunteers continue to give their time and expertise to our programs and more importantly to the people we serve every day.

Hello to the Camp Tidnish counsellors, Roxy, Alice, Kim, all support team members – everyone who makes the camp experience happen on that beloved spot in Baie Verte. I think if you could really understand the long-lasting impact of your work for our son Nick, and for us as his family, I think it might surprise you.

Our son Nick is a mentally challenged "boy" of 26. For the last two years, he along with so many of his counterparts (and of course everyone in the world), has been isolated without much to look forward to. Camp Tidnish operating again in 2022 has made a world of difference. Voyageurs at the end of June made his year.

I have a slightly different perspective because the first year Nick went to camp, I stayed there. I saw firsthand what your days and nights are like, how challenging and tiring the work is, and the joy and love the team gives to the campers. In essence I was able to walk a mile in your shoes. This year, no one was from the previous Tidnish camps (except Alice!) – and the difficulty of losing that institutional knowledge that usually is available through returning counsellors has to be really hard! But you are doing it.

Nick is still asking when he can go back, how is Taylor, Roxy, Pickle, Alice – everyone. He looks at the Facebook page and exclaims about all of you. Your summer job brings people like Nick immeasurable joy, a break from everyday life, and memories that sustain his ongoing days.

I thank you from the bottom of my heart. On these unbelievably hot days, where you don't get a break, remember you are doing something extraordinary with lasting effect.



Learn to Boccia in partnership with Northwood has increased in both sessions and length of class. Each week is at capacity with both players and volunteers. Learn to Boccia also conducted "Try It" sessions in several schools in the Halifax Regional Municipality which has prompted the Schools Plus program to purchase equipment and include this inclusive sport into the school system for the coming year.

Learn to Wheel expanded to more communities this year with programs in Yarmouth and Sydney thanks to new partnerships made with Wheelchair Basketball Canada and Cape Breton University.

Serenity Acres was the home for Learn to Ride this year and the 2-week camp for kids and youth was at full capacity. New riders learned about horse care, farm chores and enjoyed learning how to ride with the help of volunteers and amazingly gentle horses.



In partnership with the Maritime Conservatory, Learn to Dance ran a full Fall and Spring Session with kids from 6 to 16 learning the fundamentals of movement, stretching and dancing in this fully inclusive class.



The past few years in our Take Part Programs, we have been the recipient of amazing volunteers who are students of Dr. Sarah Moore, enrolled in the School of Health and Human Performance at Dalhousie University. As part of their curriculum, students choose the activities they want to volunteer with and because of that, we have enthusiastic and dedicated volunteers to help with each inclusive sport.

In 2023, student Hannah Brown undertook an evaluation performance review of our Take Part Programs for kids. We are so grateful and pleased for the results, of which will help us better serve kids and youth with disabilities in Nova Scotia.

Easter Seals Nova Scotia and the Nova Scotia Department of Community Services developed a Service Agreement in the past year which included increased funding for the growing wait list of DCS clients waiting for their wheelchairs. As result as of March 31, 2023, the wait list was eliminated for the first time in the program's history!


The Nova Scotia Wheelchair Recycling Program provided funding approval for 231 wheelchairs for DCS clients this fiscal year. We also provided just over \$245,000.00 for 731 repairs for wheelchairs in this program and we currently have 1110 active clients with 1257 wheelchairs in the province.

Our Assistive Devices we have provided over 150 pieces of equipment free of charge and have received 158 donations this year of equipment that was either refurbished or reduced to parts to maintain equipment in inventory. We currently have 1147 pieces of equipment out in the community.

Opened last December, the Yarmouth office now is an inventory and delivery satellite office for both of these programs resulting in faster client service and larger

program opportunity for the Southwest region of the province.





Movement & Learning



The support from CIBC has supported children and their families acquire equipment and technology needed to move around independently, communicate with others, and to fully participate at school, in extra-curricular activities, and in their communities. A range of equipment such as mobility devices, hearing and speech aids, home modifications like lifts and ramps, learning and communication devices and software, and bath and toileting aids have all been provided through the program.

Our Community Employment Program including The Next Step Program for youth living with disabilities who face barriers to employment, continue to graduate young people into the labor market, There were 47 adults and youth supported over the last year through our employment programs resulting in new community employment partners and bringing our workshops to other organizations who serve persons with disabilities.

I am privileged to provide my Treasurer's Report for Easter Seals Nova Scotia for the fiscal year ended March 31st, 2023.

Easter Seals Nova Scotia was able to welcome back Campers at Camp Tidnish in the Summer of 2022 at half capacity as the restrictions for COVID-19 eased and we were able to implement solid protocols for the health and safety of campers and staff. Easter Seals Nova Scotia looks forward to continuing to increase capacity allowances in 2023 at Camp Tidnish and provide life-long experiences to all that attend.

Easter Seals Nova Scotia continues to provide services through the other three key pillars of the organization; Take Part, New Leaf Enterprises and Assisted Mobility. The New Leaf Café located at the Nova Scotia Rehabilitation Centre re-opened after closing for months due to a flood in the facility. As gatherings became possible, the catering side of New Leaf became extraordinarily busy with pre-pandemic production.

For the fiscal year 2022/2023, I am pleased to share that we recorded a minimal Excess/(deficit) revenues over expenditures \$(3,337) which slightly decreases reserves to \$650,503. The financial results are an example of management focus on providing sustainable programs to their clients and community members.

I want to thank all of the staff, volunteers and program participants for their passion and dedication to Easter Seals Nova Scotia. To our donors and funders; your contributions help make our vision of a world where everyone is included possible. We thank you for your continued support of accessibility, inclusion and equity.
